Kia ora e te whanau o te kura o Aorangi,

Welcome back to all our ākonga and whanau. What a fantastic start to the term we have had. During the first week of the holidays, all the teachers were back on deck learning about the curriculum changes that are going on, and looking at ways we can best support your tamariki in their learning. They got stuck in and carried out planning for our topic this term "Tūrangawaewae" - looking at the place we call home. We also looked at why we, as teachers, chose to work at Aorangi Primary School. By answering this question we were able to come up with our core purpose as educators:


### School Hours:

We have a number of students who are continuously late to school. It is important that each student begins the day on a positive note and with their peers. Each class begins with Karakia, Waiata, Daily Notices, and what's on for the day before moving into their learning. These are all important for your child to be part of. When they are late, they miss whanaungatanga - connecting with others, and often disturb other students when entering and joining in. Remember our school hours are 8.55am to 3.00pm.

### **Attendance:**

The Ministry of Education has made it a priority to increase student attendance at school to 80% present for more than 90% of the term. The graph below shows our weekly percentage rates of students attending school. On average, we are meeting the governments target, however, our regular attendance at school is still very low - only 40% of students have regular attendance (less than 5 days absent for the term each).

It is really important that your child is at school every day. A day missed is never caught up. Staff members will begin contacting whanau if your child is away for 3 consecutive days or showing regular patterns of absence.



Let's work together to improve student attendance and their engagement in learning.

Best dressed matched rider and wheels wins a prize.


Friday is Pink Shirt Day and Sausage Sizzle Day. Sausage Sizzle \$2.50.

## PC4L - POSITIVE CULTURE 4 LEARNING

During term 1 we collected data based on the positive behaviour in Aorangi Primary School. Students are rewarded with a Falcon Eyes Slip when they are caught displaying our school values. We have had a great response from all students with this step in our initiative. We have even had our first 3 students receive a certificate for achieving 10 Falcon Eyes Slips in one particular value - Pono.
